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# **WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION**

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## **Dear Colleagues**

Welcome to the **STREETREACH** Annual Report for 2005/2006.

This has been a year where projects, local authorities, health and the Police waited with bated breath for the launch of the Home Office Prostitution Strategy.

It was released on 17 February after a long consultation process. The Streetreach Project welcomes the Strategy, which gives clear emphasis and guidance in supporting those involved in prostitution to exit this lifestyle. The 5 key points are:-

- Prevention – awareness raising, prevention and early intervention measures to stop individuals, particularly children and young people from becoming involved in prostitution.
- Tackling demand – responding to community concerns by deterring those who create the demand and removing the opportunity for street prostitution to take place.
- Developing routes out – proactively engaging with those involved in prostitution to provide a range of support and advocacy services to help them leave prostitution.
- Ensuring justice – bring to justice those who exploit individuals through prostitution, and those who commit violent and sexual offences against those involved in prostitution.
- Tackling off-street prostitution – targeting commercial sexual exploitation, in particular where victims are young or have been trafficked.

Since 1991 I have written many reports as founder and manager of the Streetreach Project and in my experience prostitution is not an informed choice, particularly for those involved in street prostitution. It continues to be exploitive, whether through pimps, partners and in more recent years the drug dealers.

When we first started the Streetreach Project we found that women involved in prostitution due to socio economic factors. However, the last 6 years has proved very different and the trend has changed. Clients that are met through the outreach provision admit that their involvement is due to a heroin addiction and usually use many means to fund their drug habit such as robbing from families, shoplifting and pawning jewellery etc., before becoming involved in prostitution.

The majority of young women that Streetreach works with do not wake up one day and think, "oh I know I'll be a drug user and a prostitute" it's a slippery slope, one which our clients would say that they would never have thought it would happen to them.

The Streetreach Project welcomes the Home Office Strategy and has every intention of continuing to support those involved to exit, promote working in partnership to develop service provision and share information and good practice in order to break the cycle of prostitution and drugs.

It is now 12 months since the death of Rebecca Stevenson. Rebecca was murdered at 19 years old as a direct result of her involvement in street prostitution.

If ever there were any doubts and hesitations to eradicate prostitution and legalise it, we need to remember Rebecca and the many others who have suffered abuse and ultimately died as a result of the lifestyle of drugs and prostitution.

The Streetreach activity programme has gone from strength to strength in the last 12 months. The programme is well established on a more formal setting and is clearly linked to awards and accreditations. As a result quite a number of service users have received these and one young person won the much-coveted title of "Young Person of the Year" in the prestigious Spirit of Doncaster Awards.

I do hope this report gives you an insight into the work of the project over the last 12 months including a breakdown of statistics.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank and praise the staff team who continue to challenge and be challenged in this work and continue to give 150% at all times. The Project would not have the excellent reputation and high profile it has without their continued commitment, dedication and professionalism.

Also a big thank you to the Trustees for their time and support which is given so freely, never doubting the ethos of the work and continuing to voice that at every opportunity.

Last but not least our Funders and partner organisations who help us to support and develop the services to our clients.

Despite Rebecca's murder the staff team continue to work extremely hard to encourage and support the young women to exit prostitution and drug use.

Although at first we all felt disappointed by the Home Office Review in that they did not approve the pilot of a managed zone, what we were pleased with was the emphasis on supporting women to exit prostitution in a constructive and positive way.

Whilst we are aware of how frustrating the anti-social behaviour associated with street prostitution can be for residents, we believe that without the continued effort of the STREETREACH Project the situation would be much worse. We believe the number of young women involved would be much higher and that the violence involved would increase.

So it just leaves me to say a big thank you to all the staff at the Project and the funders and organisations who support them.

# OUTREACH

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Despite the tragic death of Rebecca, the number of women seen on outreach remains constant at about 100 individual women. Closer analysis shows that approximately 60 of these are very active and have been involved in prostitution and drugs for many years. The main drug of choice continues to be Heroin but the majority of the women also use crack/cocaine.

With additional funding we have increased the outreach to three sessions per week, this has also enabled us to vary times and days in the attempt not to miss anyone that maybe new, so that early intervention can be offered.

The main aims of the outreach are to address personal safety and encourage the women to access the services available at the Streetreach Centre.

We continue to work closely with the Police and meet on a regular basis to share information, monitor trends and plan joint initiatives.

The residents in the area used for soliciting are extremely distressed by the anti-social behaviour associated with street prostitution and drugs.

There was a lot of hope that the Home Office Strategy would allow the opportunity to pilot a "managed Zone", however, this was not included and a zero tolerance approach was encouraged.

The Strategy has five key objectives

- ➡ Prevention
- ➡ Tackling Demand
- ➡ Developing Routes Out
- ➡ Ensuring Justice
- ➡ Tackling Off-Street Prostitution

Whilst we have many excellent examples of good practice across the five key objectives the "tackling demand" is limited. At this time we have police officers from the Safer Neighbourhood Team who cover the Town Centre with responsibility of a variety of roles; i.e. violent crime, licensing, begging and retail crime. This team also have responsibility across the Borough for street prostitution, hence the limitations.

Whilst all partner agencies welcome the Home Office Review, in order to co-operate and implement a zero tolerance approach this will not be achieved without having a dedicated team of police officers to implement the Home Office Strategy.

# THE STREETREACH CENTRE

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The Streetreach Centre is open five days per week and covers the hours of 9.00 am to 5.00 pm. A drop-in facility is allowable five times a week.

It is essential that the project continues to have this amount of access and service provision in order to enable and support our clients to move on to more positive lifestyles.

Whenever possible our programmes/workshops are accredited and portfolios are developed to evidence the work the clients are involved in.

It is also important to have opening times available to coincide with other services so that the women can make appointments and organise either being seen at the Streetreach Centre or accompanied visits arranged.

The Streetreach Project has excellent partnership arrangements offering easy access and fast track services creating a one-stop shop facility.

# **A fast track social inclusion drug treatment programme for women involved in prostitution**

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The Drug Treatment Programme is now a well-established core element of the project. It is now in its fifth year and has helped many women to exit the life of street prostitution and drugs.

As a result of the success of the programme, the number of women who have requested help to address their drug use has diminished and those who are now seeking help are, in the main, been entrenched in the lifestyle of drugs and prostitution for many years. These women are more difficult to engage and maintain in treatment and also present with many more physical and mental health issues, usually compounded by homelessness.

The emphasis of the programme is still social inclusion and we place high importance on moving away from "substitute prescribing", encouraging women to discover their many talents that have been locked away, some times for years because of their chaotic life styles and involvement in the drug culture.

The programme still has its four components:

**Early Intervention** – outreach is now three times a week, encouraging women to access the project as well as taking drug and health advice out into the streets. It is also usually the first point of contact with women who are new to the area and an invaluable point of contact with those who have relapsed and need to re-engage with the drug treatment programme.

**Structured Support** – provides the "rap around service" which is so important in keeping women engaged whether or not they are in receipt of a prescription.

**Clinical Intervention** – which is either detox or maintenance prescribing (Subutex or methadone). A very important element of this is aftercare support, which needs to be flexible to individual needs and not time limited.

**Social Inclusion** – offering access to education, training and employment as well as advice and help with social needs including housing, health and finances. A crucial part of our intervention is partnership working and sign posting, our mantra is "*if we don't know the answer, we know someone who does*".

Over the last 12 months, 48 women have been offered the opportunity to address their drug use, 22 of these women are currently in treatment. Of these 12 women have been reunited with family and in many cases are having increased access to

their children who are being cared for by grandparents. We have also had four beautiful health babies born, and all are living with parents without any intervention from child protection agencies. Six women are currently in employment and three are attending college undertaking short-term access to education courses.



## **HOW WE MEASURE SUCCESS**

We measure success by the positive impact we have on someone's life, sometimes change is hard to quantify. Lapse and relapse are part of change, many of our clients will lapse but importantly they will continue to engage with us through either outreach or the drop-in.

# SEXUAL HEALTH CLINIC

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For many years the Streetreach Project has had a fast track system into the GU medicine service, to address sexual health issues. However, it was always an aim to establish an onsite service.

It was with great excitement and enthusiasm from all that a partnership between Streetreach and the Outreach Sexual Health Service was agreed in July 2005.

Zena Jones, the Outreach Nurse for Sexual Health, who is leading this initiative, has become a valued member of our team.

The clinic is once a month with emergency appointments negotiated as necessary.

The aims of the service are:-

- To work in partnership to improve the sexual health status of the adults and young people involved in prostitution and/or sexual exploitation in Doncaster in line with National Policy and Priorities.
- For individual partners to collaborate consent and participate in order to agree and ensure the delivery of the project.

The objectives of the service are:-

- The provision of a suitable environment to hold a clinic for young women.
- To support and encourage Streetreach clients to have the confidence to access the clinic to discuss relationships or sexual health issues.
- To liaise with health professionals regarding concerns with individuals that may benefit from multi disciplinary working and appropriate referral.
- The Outreach Nurse attends the Streetreach venue once a month. Alternative arrangements will be negotiated if unforeseen circumstances prevent attendance.

Since the service began in July 2005 to 31 March 2006, 22 individual clients have accessed the services offered. These include STI screening, cervical smears, contraception advice, referral to GUM and advice about sex related issues.

All women who have been identified as needing treatment have all attended their follow-up appointments.

# **Work with girls aged 19 and under**

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We are pleased to report that as in the previous two years we have not identified any young people under the age of 16 involved in street prostitution in Doncaster. We believe that if there were any young people we would have identified them ourselves through outreach or through information from the Police, Community Wardens, residents or older women/girls who frequent the area. This network of information ensures early identification of any young people hanging around the area used for soliciting and they are picked up immediately and returned to a place of safety and appropriate agencies informed. We are concerned that a number of Under 18s who had been on the periphery of prostitution through their network of associates are now becoming involved themselves due to their increased drug misuse. We work closely with the young people's drug service (Better Deal) and this enables us to co-work individual young people and offer a more comprehensive package of support.

The majority of young people we work with are being sexually exploited by adult males known to them or introduced through their network of friends and acquaintances. They have frequent absences from home and whilst they often disclose names, addresses and car registration numbers, subsequent investigations usually reveal false names etc. Due to the excellent interagency working in Doncaster we are able to receive and share information with other workers and to co-ordinate that information through mapping exercises. Most of the young people are engaged with appropriate agencies and we are able to support them in accessing the Sexual Health Outreach Team, Young Peoples Drug Team (Better Deal) and Connexions (Youth Service).

As a result of having a support worker this year we have been able to offer more intense support and this has had a positive impact in terms of the young people's health, social and education welfare. The young people have regularly accessed the Sexual Health Outreach Team with support from Streetreach and the Educational Welfare Officer on the Distance Learning Package. They have engaged well with the Teenage Pregnancy Connexions PA and two young people are planning to enrol on full-time college courses in September. We have been able to do joint home visits with the EWO (DLP) and feel that this extra support for parents leads to improved communication within the family.

All the young people we work with identify as being white British.



## **DISTANCE LEARNING PACKAGE (DLP)**

The Distance Learning Package was devised approximately eight years ago with the specific aim of attempting to address the unique educational needs of children and young people being exploited through prostitution or at risk of becoming involved. It was initially an informal arrangement between Education Welfare and Streetreach with Beckett Road Pupil Referral Unit providing educational resources and support.

Beckett Road PRU now receives funding to co-ordinate, facilitate and deliver the DLP with a teacher, assistant and specialist EWO in attendance at sessions. Streetreach delivers the 'Awards' strand of the DLP.

The young people who are enrolled on DLP and not involved in prostitution but are young people who have been identified as being sexually exploited through their association with adult males and in most cases, regular periods of running away. They have erratic patterns of very poor, or no school attendance and the usual strategies to engage or re-engage them have been unsuccessful. Suitability for DLP is assessed by the specialist EWO and is then formalised through discussion with the Head of Beckett Road and parents/carers of the young person and the young person themselves.

The young people are given a timetable with sessions taking place covering the core national curriculum and a life-skills programme. The sessions take place over 5 days at three different venues.

Streetreach delivers a varied programme tailored to the needs of the pupils on the DLP and this year we have covered areas such as:-

- Prostitution
- Sexual Exploitation
- Drugs/Alcohol Awareness
- Black History Month
- Arts and Crafts
- Sexual Health and Reality Baby
- Healthy Eating

Streetreach also provides extra-curricular activities.

The DLP pupils build a portfolio of work throughout the year and these are submitted for evaluation through Duke of Edinburgh and Youth Achievement Awards. The Awards are a new component of our DLP programme and this has been extremely successful due to having an additional member of staff to do the extra work involved in collating evidence, co-ordinating sessions and liaising with Youth Service Awards staff. This year we have been fortunate to have the support of a worker from New Deal for the Communities who we worked alongside to deliver a 6 weeks Healthy Eating Programme and a worker from Connexions (Teenage Pregnancy/Sexual Health) to deliver the sessions on the Reality Baby programme.



## **SCHOOL PREVENTION PROGRAMME**

The School Prevention Programme is offered to Year 10 and above pupils in schools throughout Doncaster. The aim is to deliver an education package that raises awareness of the realities/risks and consequences of prostitution. This takes place within the schools Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) sessions.

We deliver the programme in a workshop setting with the pupils (approximately 30 males/females) working in small peer groups. They have the opportunity to look at attitudes and perceptions around prostitution and the association of drug misuse. Questions are written down at the beginning of the session and answered towards the end with sufficient time left for any questions not raised during the session.

Schools that have taken part in the programme this year include:-

- Don Valley
- Edlington
- Adwick
- Northcliffe
- Danum

The programme has been evaluated by the Healthy Schools Co-ordinators and has been awarded the Healthy Schools Quality Mark. Some funding for this and the DLP is provided through the Teenage Pregnancy Budget.



## **NON-SCHOOL BASED PROVISION**

We receive many calls from other agencies/organisations and from within the Youth Service because workers have concerns that young people they are working with are involved in behaviour that makes them vulnerable to sexual exploitation. Streetreach is usually the first point of contact for advice/information/support when these issues arise for staff. We are able to offer a number of interventions and these include:-

- 1-2-1 exploring personal safety/appropriate relationships
- Counselling
- Group awareness sessions – Youth Clubs
- Sign posting to appropriate services – Foyer, Housing
- Support for the worker involved

We believe that workers within other agencies already have a wide range of skills in place that they can use when working on issues of sexual exploitation. They have often built up a relationship, which has enabled young people to disclose their patterns of behaviour, and we would share our knowledge, offer advice and support for the worker to be able to work alongside that young person on issues of sexual exploitation. Most of the young people we come into contact with are on 'agency overload' and our aim is to support staff in a consistent approach and sustained relationship.



## TRAINING/PRESENTATIONS

- Streetreach provides the training for all Youth Workers/Trainee Youth Workers/Connexions Pas (Youth Service). This forms part of Youth Services Staff's Yearly Training Developmental Plan on sexual exploitation and drugs.
- Session delivered to young people on the Hair and Beauty course at Stainforth College.



## MULTI-AGENCY FORUM

The Multi-Agency Forum on Sexually Exploited Young People continues to be the most appropriate way of monitoring young people and setting action plans. The Forum is well established (approximately 12 years) and an excellent working relationship exists between Forum members. This currently includes:-

- Police (Child Protection)
- Better Deal (Young People's Drugs Service)
- Social Services
- Education Welfare
- Education
- Streetreach
- Youth Offending Service
- Barnardo's Leaving Care
- Jigsaw
- Youth Service
- Sexual Health Outreach Team

There is an open membership extended to all agencies/organisations who feel they have a role to play on the Forum or who may be working with a young person and need to attend.

The Forum is a sub-group of the Doncaster Safeguarding Children's Board.



## NETWORKING

Streetreach attends and is a member of the National Working Group on Young People's Services. Meetings take place four times a year at different venues across the UK. This is an excellent forum for sharing information, support, keeping up-to-date with trends across the country and influencing Government Policy. Issues of concern nationally continue to be trafficking of women/young people into and within Britain and discussions are taking place on how we can co-ordinate responses. Whilst we do not have any evidence of this locally we continue to be vigilant and to keep up-to-date with the current situation through liaising with other areas and learning from their strategies and good practice.

# Personal safety work

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In June 2005 we were successful in securing funding through the Home Office Victims Fund. This has enabled us to employ a full-time member of staff initially for one year to address personal safety of the women involved in street prostitution in Doncaster.

Although the Project has always had an excellent working relationship with the Police, we have now put this on a more formal footing and have drawn up policies and protocols for joint working.

The key objective of the role of personal safety worker is to promote the Ugly Mug Scheme. This is to alert the women of any potentially dangerous clients, encourage them to report incidents of sexual assaults and violent crimes against them and support them through the criminal justice system.

We want to hi-light that crimes against those involved in prostitution should not be seen as a "hazard of the job", but that it is a crime like any other.

Throughout this year we have done displays in the Streetreach centre hi-lighting the issues of sexual and violent crime, we distribute leaflets promoting personal safety on the outreach.

A number of women have come forward and reported "Dodgy Punters" and this information has been shared with other service users and also the Police. We also actively encourage the women to formerly report crimes against them and as a result of offering support throughout the process, a number of positive convictions have been achieved.

It is the intention to develop personal safety workshops in the Streetreach centre and continue to keep the issue high on the agenda in order to prevent further violence and sexual assaults.

# Contributions from clients

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I have used this service for four years. I first met the Streetreach team on outreach. I started using Streetreach to help me with my drug use. I have been clean a year but I still come for support. Since I have been accessing Streetreach it has also been for family support. I am now in a full-time college course working towards a NVQ in Catering. My goals for the future are to have my own restaurant and have a family. Hopefully from the outcome of my course I can achieve this. I am also in a stable and loving relationship with my partner. I could not have had if I was still involved in drugs and prostitution. I feel I have achieved so much confidence and lots of strength through the help and support of the staff at Streetreach.



Brilliant, good place always someone to talk to – help you achieve goals you want to aim for.



I came to meet other people, talk and have a cup of coffee, they always nag me about the four sugars but they let me have them!



At first I just used the needle exchange, then got to know people, now you can't keep me away. I hope to do my detox soon!



Streetreach are wicked even when they nag me to do my work! I know I have got somebody who cares and I can get in touch with them anytime. ... (Under 19s young person)



I didn't go to school and never thought I would get a job that I wanted. Because of Streetreach I have got a bit more confidence and they made me believe I could do better for myself. I am doing a college course and know they will always be there for me if it goes wrong (I hope it won't)! ... (Under 19s young person)

# PLAN

*For the Future*

## THE FUTURE

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We are always striving to improve the services and facilities available through the Streetreach Project.

We were successful last year in receiving funding through the Home Office to focus on personal safety.

This enabled us to employ a full time worker to promote personal safety amongst the women, encourage the reporting of crimes against them and support them through the criminal justice system.

This has been extremely successful. The women recognise that sexual and violent abuse against them is "not a hazard of the job". Also a number of positive convictions have been achieved against perpetrators.

Whilst the outreach and services in the Streetreach Centre are very well established and excellent in focusing on supporting the women to move on to more positive lifestyles, housing is still a big gap in service.

It is our intention to focus on funding streams that will help us address this issue during 2006/07. We would hope to establish funding to enable us to employ a full time member of staff who has experience of working in housing/homeless. We would want to identify gaps in current housing provision, establish liaison with housing providers and offer tenancy support to the clients in order to maintain residency when appropriate housing is found.

We will also continue to work closely with our colleagues locally and nationally and actively participate and support new initiatives led by the Home Office Prostitution Strategy.

We will continue to monitor and evaluate services available and encourage service user participation in this process.

We strive to always develop and offer the very best in holistic services in order for women involved in prostitution in Doncaster to move on to a more positive lifestyle.
